Are there such things as *ghosts*? What is it that is so fascinating about the *supernatural*? We love to hear stories about *ghosts* that have “*returned to reclaim*” their property, making their presence known in various ways. Many of these tales involve the victims of tragic shipwrecks along the Jersey shore, pirate spirits returning to claim their bounty, and other tales that continue to haunt the 127 mile stretch of the beaches of New Jersey. Some of these haunting tales deal with lighthouses where strange lights appear, ghostly images float around lantern rooms and inhuman sounds emanate from the tower.

The Absecon Lighthouse in Atlantic City is reported to be haunted, they even have “*Haunted Lighthouse Tours*”. It seems that footsteps have been heard ascending and descending the stairs to and from the tower, whiffs of cigar and pipe smoke can be detected by visitors, there are voices and laughter heard in the lantern room, and a spectral hand coming out of a coat sleeve with a white cuff would appear then disappear on the railing.

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Lighthouse Hauntings

Since there have been 7 deaths in the lighthouse, plus over one thousand deaths and many shipwrecks in this area, “Ghost Hunters” were called in to check out this supernatural phenomena. Cameras and other very sensitive equipment were placed in various areas of the lighthouse.

Strange voices, shadows and crazy sounds emanated from the 3rd landing; plus, the Nor’easter wind howling outside around the tower sounded like ghostly conversations.

Footsteps were even heard in the keeper’s quarters. According to the “ghost hunting” equipment something supernatural was taking place in the lighthouse.

Ghost hunters were also called in to check out paranormal activity at Hereford Inlet Lighthouse. According to the report, there was no activity recorded but if you just happen to sit on a certain bench in the beautiful Hereford gardens, it has been said that you can hear the former keepers talking and other ghostly activities taking place within the lighthouse.

Then there is the tale of a handsome, young ghost couple that strolls along the beach near Barnegat Light looking for their baby daughter. It seems that they were separated from the infant when the schooner they were aboard ran aground near the light. If you visit the Barnegat Lighthouse around 7 PM some evening, you just might catch a glimpse of this ghost couple walking on the beach, humming a lullaby softly while looking for their lost child.

It seems that there are also angry, restless Confederate ghosts who haunt Finn’s Point Light and Fort Mott. The tale is told that every day during the Civil War boatloads of Confederate corpses were hauled into the area near the light and dumped into trenches.

On foggy, moonless nights, visitors to the Light have reported hearing the faint notes of taps being played amidst moans and shouts from the adjoining graveyard.

Ranks of soldiers marching in formation are also seen on occasion. Over 2500 soldiers died at Fort Delaware in this same area.

Speaking of Delaware, it seems that even though the Cape Henlopen Lighthouse toppled into the sea several years ago, it seems that again on foggy nights its ghostly beacon can be seen guiding ships safely through the fog. According to some books it seems that Cape May holds the record for being the “most haunted seashore resort.”

Almost every Victorian house, inn, shoppe and even Congress Hall and Higbee’s Beach has had its ghosts and stories of haunting. Bunkers near Cape May Point built during World War II reportedly are still manned by a ghostly crew. Public visiting the bunker witnessed “spectral sailors performing their duties inside and outside of the edifice.

Eerie conversations were heard; ghost lights appeared and cigarettes were lit. These men, so devoted to duty, remain on guard long after they passed away”

Visitors to the Cape May Lighthouse have reported seeing spirits ambling around the lighthouse. Could it be Captain Kidd looking for the infamous Cape May diamonds that he once buried at Cape May Point? Lake Lily, a private watering hole near Cape May Lighthouse is said to still attract pirate spectors searching for fresh water and treasures buried there.

If you are planning on visiting New Jersey in the summer, sign up for one of the ghost tours offered in most shore towns. Don’t forget we have “The Jersey Devil”. Guess he hasn’t gotten around to visiting lighthouses lately!!

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MORE G'HORY STORIES

From the files of Director Bill Geilfuss

FORT WOOD on Bedloe's Island
Fort Wood stood on Bedloe's Island, Captain Kidd's treasure lay beneath it. In 1825 a Sergeant Gibbs was stationed there and was told by a psychic how to locate gold. Walking the beach with a divining rod in his hand and a recruit named Carpenter as his lookout he suddenly saw the rod dip down, beneath his feet was the treasure. They dug down about ten feet and hit something solid, it was the treasure chest. As they tried to open it there was a bright flash of light, a giant figure of a long dead pirate, killed and left in the pit so his ghost would protect Captain Kidd's treasure for all time. One last bit of ghost's revenge was because of their screams of fright the guards came from the fort and charged them with AOWL from their posts. If you would like to go there and try your luck digging up gold, they have changed the name of the island. The actual history of the island goes back to the 17th century. It has been known as Bedloo and Love Island and on it had a dwelling house and a Lighthouse as far back as 1753. The island had been used as a smallpox quarantine station. In 1758 New York bought it for 1,000 pounds for use as a Pest House. On February 15, 1800 New York ceded the island to the federal government for the construction of a defensive fort. This 11 point granite fortification was nicknamed Star Fort. The cornerstone was laid August 5, 1884, for a magnificent Lighthouse a gift of the people of France. The Statue of Liberty now stands at what was Fort Wood. For the 17 years that the statue served as an aid to navigation the keepers sometimes heard the ghostly laugh of the guardian of Kidd's chest. DEATH ON THE ROCKS

Execution Rocks Lighthouse

Sands Point Long Island, New York

In the years leading up to the Revolutionary War, if you lived in NYC and voiced your opposition to King George's policy toward the colonies, you could be arrested, found guilty and sentenced to "The Rock"

To be hung would only bring on the rebels. Instead they would be taken out to Long Island Sound to execution rock chained to ring bolts set into the rock.-left there to await the Tide to come in to end it all. But did their ghosts ever leave.. "The Rock"?



A popular story from some local fishermen who have been known to say that ghosts of the men who died on the rock reef, whether it be tortured Revelations War prisoners or victims of ship wrecks, have been sighted near the light station. Allegedly, due to the Rock's ghostly history, the US Lighthouse Service relieved any keeper from duty without question. Keepers usually felt service on the "Rock" was like a death sentence.



A Tale of Murder, Suicide and Music

One of the best known lighthouse ghost tales takes place on Maine's Seguin Island. Seguin light has the only first order Fresnel lens, is one of the highest lights in Maine, one of the foggiest and one of the loneliest. While it is located only three miles off shore, in the winter it is cut off from civilization most of the time by snowstorms and high seas. In mid 1800's a new keeper brought his bride to their new home.

Point Lookout Lighthouse

The haunted Point Lookout Lighthouse is located at the mouth of the Potomac River at Chesapeake Bay in Maryland and is believed to be the most haunted lighthouse in North America.

Built as a 1 ½ story building in 1830, it was eventually rebuilt as a 2 story structure in 1883.

What makes it so Haunted? First a U.S. General

Hospital was first built, then a prison camp was also built during the Civil War. Many died in this prison due to over crowding, disease thus hauntings were reported as early as 1860. The first lighthouse keeper has also been known to haunt this lighthouse. Ann Davis has reportedly been seen at the top of the haunted Point Lookout Lighthouse stairs. Both male and female apparitions have been seen here especially in the basement. Doors mysteriously open and close, while people have also heard snoring, ghostly voices, footsteps and other strange sounds within the lighthouse and on the grounds.

After many months of this she went out of her mind and he did the only thing he could, he bricked her up in the oil room and just told everyone she went home to her family in the south.

SEGUIN ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE

After a short time she complained about nothing to do. He had a piano ferried to the light. She played with sheet music but only one song came with the piano. She kept playing the same song continuously, so often she drove the keeper insane. In a fit of madness he took an axe and chopped the piano and her to pieces, then killed himself. It's sad, she still plays on, people passing by can still hear her playing a quiet airs. Later keepers told of slamming doors, coats knocked off hooks, tools moved and a bearded man in rain slicker climbing the steps to the light room. Others have seen a woman walking the gantry late at night. In 1985 the Coast Guard was automating the



light, had all of the furniture packed ready to move the next day. That night the warrant officer in charge was shaken from his sleep by the ghost of the keeper who warned him "don't take my furniture, leave my house alone". In the morning the dory was loaded with all the belongings, finished loading it on the skid that was to go down to sea level, when suddenly the motor stopped the chain holding the dory parted and took a 200 foot ride to the sea full speed. So, the furniture never left the island. When you go out to Seguin listen for the music, look for the music; look for the keeper who is still trimming the wick.

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PORT BOCA GRANDE LIGHTHOUSE


