Mike Rothman, Captain of the Bonanza, provides an "up close and personal view" of these lighthouses. All the tours are narrated by former lighthouse keepers and former members of the coast guard. Our first outreach program, Delaware Bay Days, took place at Bivalve, NJ on June 12th. Rich Chiemingo, Museum Educator at the Cape May Lighthouse started his presentation of the Cape May Lighthouse with the history of lighthouses going back to the days of President George Washington and Treasury Secretary Alexander Hamilton. Secretary Hamilton had interviewed Port Wardens in New York and Pennsylvania with the determined fact that the Bay and Delaware River, reasoning was in desperate need of a lighthouse or similar facility due to the fact that Philadelphia was such an important seaport and the only access was through Delaware Bay and River.

Also, that all shipping bound for England and the New England/New York coast ports had to navigate around Cape May.

Cape May became a major whaling port considering the whale population in the Delaware Bay/River. Many of the Mayflower descendents relocated from Massachusetts to the area.

As early as 1744 it was known that there was a light of sorts in Cape May.

1785 was a turning point when the Pennsylvania Port Wardens purchased property in Cape May for the purpose of building a lighthouse to benefit navigation.

In 1823 the first known lighthouse began operation it was approximately 88 feet above sea level. It had 15 lamps and 16" reflector revolving, according to know records. It was rebuilt in 1847. This new lighthouse stood 78 feet tall. The beacon had polished mirrors (bowl type) to reflect the light this included 15 reflectors with three faces.

The Lighthouse Service was doing such a poor job of maintaining their lighthouse that Congress appointed a new Lighthouse Board to reorganize the lighthouse system. Many of the members of the Board were marine knowledgeable.

In 1851 Cape May's inspection by the new Lighthouse Board's found the building in unacceptable condition. It leaked and basically was falling apart. The keepers had no training, no basic supplies and no instructions and the lifesaving boathouse was lock and there was no key.

In 1857 Congress approved \$40,000 for rebuilding and to include a firstorder lens. This was the demise of the 10 year old and it was demolished in 1862

This year 1857 brought the likes of architect General George Meade an Army Engineer to Cape May and designed the beginning of "State of the art" lighthouse as we know it today. When the old lighthouse was torn down many Cape May residents purchase the bricks for pennies and they are still evident in homes and chimneys.

The lamp was lit on Halloween 1859. This magnificent lighthouse almost 160 foot tall has 199 spiral iron steps, plus 12 leading to the lantern.

Cape May Lighthouse is the second oldest continually operation lighthouse in the country. It is second only to Sandy Hook (1794). All lighthouse were dark during World War II
